Syllabus VIII: Open Call for Guest Partner



Syllabus VII at Eastside Projects, August 2024

Wysing Arts Centre (Cambridgeshire); Eastside Projects (Birmingham); Spike Island (Bristol); Studio Voltaire (London); PS ² (Belfast) and New Art Exchange (Nottingham), invite expressions of interest for a new Guest Partner for Syllabus VIII, a collaboratively produced alternative learning programme.

Syllabus supports ten artists a year through a roaming programme of gatherings hosted by the partner organisations and an online artist development programme.

A landmark grant from the Freelands Foundation has secured the future of Syllabus for the next ten years and has given us the opportunity to expand the programme with new partners and support for participating artists.

Our Permanent Partners bring:

- Creative ideas for supporting artists through physical and online programmes.
- Knowledge or experience lacking from the current consortium of partners.
- A commitment to supporting emerging artists.
- A commitment to positive changes in Equity, Diversity and Inclusion.

Guest Partner

While the above criteria are still important for the Guest Partner, we hope to accommodate a partner who would be unable to commit to Syllabus in the long term. This could include organisations without long term funding, organisations overseas, non-art organisations, biennials, festivals, studios, artist publishing organisations, and individuals - this is not an exhaustive list.

What is the new partner expected to commit to Syllabus?

- To host one physical two day gathering or an online programme in 2025–26.
- To attend online planning meetings and a minimum of one physical gathering to meet the artists.
- To help promote the Open Call for artists in your networks and to participate in the programme evaluation.

What support will the partner receive?

- Guest partners will have a budget of £2,000 towards the cost of programming a gathering collaboratively with Syllabus artists (costs include e.g. guest speakers / facilitators, food, materials). This does not include overheads (space hire, partner staff time etc.).
- All partners will have the support of a dedicated Syllabus Coordinator.

What benefits do partner organisations receive?

- Opportunities to engage in shared learning e.g. best practices for evaluation processes and antiracism training.
- Meaningful engagement with peer organisations, leading to shared learning.
- A supportive network of peer organisations with different specialisms and expertise.
- Curatorial development working closely with a group of artists to support ideas and outcomes.
- The opportunity to research artists from partner organisation regions.

Syllabus Frequently Asked Questions

What is Syllabus?

Syllabus is a collaboratively produced alternative and independent learning programme that supports ten artists across ten months. Syllabus is led by Wysing Arts Centre, with consortium partners Wysing Arts Centre (Cambridgeshire); Eastside Projects (Birmingham); Spike Island (Bristol); Studio Voltaire (London); PS ² (Belfast) and New Art Exchange (Nottingham).

What are the Key Aims of Syllabus?

- To provide professional development and education opportunities to artists who are unable to access traditional postgraduate routes
- To diversify the arts sector
- To provide a strong peer network for artists
- To create a meaningful network of arts organisations that work together to share learning and promote best practice with regards to equality, diversity, and anti-racism.

Who does Syllabus support?

- Syllabus supports ten artists each year from a range of backgrounds.
- We aim to establish a cohort that represents a diversity of cultural perspectives and artistic practices and welcome applications from a wide geographic spread across the UK.
- We look for artists who want to both develop their own work and actively contribute to the development of each year's programme.
- Participating artists must have been out of formal education (arts and non-arts) for at least 4
 years. We are also keen to support artists who have not progressed through formal art training
 routes.

Participating artists benefit from:

- The opportunity to rethink individual practices through an intensive programme of gatherings, hosted by the partner organisations.
- Working together to collaboratively shape and develop a reflexive, collective learning experience.
- Critical conversations about ideas and work in progress within a supportive, national network of artists, curators and organisations.
- Becoming part of a new network of artist peers.
- Introductions to, and connections with, arts organisations, communities and networks in cities across the UK and access to new networks, expertise and resources.
- Two 1-2-1 mentoring sessions with the Artistic Advisor over the course of the year.
- One 1-2-1 mentoring session with a partner organisation.

What is the programme structure?

Each year's Syllabus programme is built around a series of co-produced intensive gatherings, which the ten selected artists attend. During the first retreat at Wysing, Syllabus artists, individuals connected to the partner organisations the Syllabus Coordinator and the Artistic Advisor collaborate to identify broad themes for the programme. These form the starting point for an evolving, responsive curriculum that will support individual and collective artistic development and provide access to networks and knowledge across the ten months of the programme. Subsequent weekend gatherings are hosted at partner venues.

The Syllabus artists and Artistic Advisor and Syllabus Coordinator work with individual organisations to shape each retreat, which in addition to responding to the interests of the Syllabus artists, reflects the research interests and specialisms and the location of the various partner organisations. Planned activities may include workshops led by the organisations' alumni artists; visits to local arts organisations, network events with local artists etc. Syllabus concludes with a final gathering at Wysing, which is usually held in March.

Between the gatherings, discussions are continued remotely with an online programme of workshops, mentoring and crit sessions, with texts and reading lists uploaded onto a shared drive to support these discussions and enabling them to be continued remotely.
